Historic Clifton

In the early days of Clifton, it is clear the churches and the messages therein were taken quite seriously by the local attendees. Seldom do we speak of a sermon theme, unless we are with like-minded worshippers, or even our own church/templegoers. Perhaps such open-ness helped neighbors "stay the course" of accountability one to another, and to remain somewhat centered on a variety of issues, perspectives and biblically shared-knowledge. Today's diverse world, especially in our geographic area, can give rise to new insights, perspectives and comfort in getting to know someone who does not share the same faith heritage. What a gift *we* have to seek to better understand one another – rather than take the path of dismissing one another.

Yet, we learn that the Women's Missionary Society undertook time in learning of a different culture in India, with the insights that women and girls were not being properly treated. With the 19th Amendment having just passed less than a month before this article was penned, it is clear that in Clifton an educated woman could help to educate others and thereby construct strategies of awareness and assistance to those in need of same. Remember, an educated lady will educate a family! Bravo, Ladies!

Clifton's focus on school, teachers and the interwoven fabric of community, teachers and children made, again, a level of accountability. Parents were expected to support the schools, ensure their children studied and participated and go on to do "good things"! Miss Margaret Detwiler and Miss Esther Buckley are heralded as having made wise and worldly decisions. Miss Buckley has accepted a position at Frostburg, Maryland's Normal School. This is a term that might cause the casual listener a bit of consternation. However, the term "normal school" comes from the French école normale, a sixteenth-century model school with model classrooms where model teaching practices were taught to teacher candidates. In the United States, normal schools were developed and built primarily to train elementary-level teachers for the public schools - in essence making an education a "normal" life stage – bringing with it a sense of maturity, literacy and sound social skills.

The delight in welcoming new babies into the world is indeed a universal practice! And here Clifton is no exception! Why the Town of Clifton's citizens may still recall the ups and downs of parenting, and now of grandparenting! With the presence of the Nickum, Effros, Netschert, Franca, Rusnak, Jarrendt, Thompson families – and SO many others – the joy of "new family" continues to this day!

Enjoy this slice of Clifton doings from the Autumn of 1920!

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Renn and children have returned from a visit to Mr. Renn's parents in Williamsport, Pa.

Miss Esther Buckley left Sunday afternoon to take up her duties as Home Economics teacher in the Normal School at Frostburg, Md. Her father and mother accompany her to Washington.

The many friends of Mrs. Sara C. Edwards were very much shocked to hara of her recent sudden death in Younkers, N.Y. Mrs. Edwards was the widow of the late Rev. Wm. H. Edwards, who for twenty years was pastor of the Presbyterian Church of this place, until his death five years ago.

Master Lewis Ensor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elijah Ensor, has been quite ill with a very serious affliction of the bones in the back of one of his ears, but is not better.

Mrs. Wm. Mathers, Sr., has been quite ill. She is living with her daughter, Mrs. Ensor. Another daughter, Mrs. Guntpman, came to her relief to help her in her trouble.

Mrs. Lewis Watson was quite ill last week, but was better when last heard from.



Resource Recovery Tip

You probably know that most big retailers will take back plastic bags. But did you know that they also take dry cleaning bags, bread bags, Ziplock type bags, bubble wrap, ice bags, and more? The recovered plastic film is reprocessed into new bags, pallets, containers, crates, pipe, and composite lumber for making decks, benches, and playground sets.

Some items that are not included are compostable bags, pre-washed salad mix bags, frozen food bags, candy bar wrappers, chip bags, and cut flower sleeves.

Some tips on how to tell if an item is plastic film.

Is there a #2 or #4 in a chasing arrows recycling symbol on the item?

Does the item hold its shape when it is crumpled?

Does it stretch instead of tearing like paper?

If you answer yes to one or more of these questions, then the resource can be recovered.

Resource recovery is more than recycling. It is finding the highest and best use for items including reuse, repurpose, rehome, and recycle.

Northern Virginia Therapeutic Riding Program (NVTRP) is thrilled to announce that the organization is moving forward in August with building the long-awaited Jean and Ric Edelman Indoor Riding Arena on its 17-acre farm, at the corner of Popes Head and Clifton Roads.

The facility will include a 17,000 square foot indoor riding arena, classroom, rider observation area, and restrooms. It will be built on the footprint cleared during the first phase of building in 2018/19, which included the construction of the Trefry Outdoor Riding Arena, Kristen P. Cubbage Memorial Playground, parking, and a reconfigured entryway.

This round of construction will also include the completion of the sitework--an additional row of parking, completing the bioretention basins that are part of the stormwater management system, and the final landscaping.

TRINITY Group Construction is the general contractor for the project. They will subcontract with Lonnie Suter of Quality Buildings to build the arena itself. Lonnie is known and respected widely for building high quality, affordably priced equestrian facilities. TRINITY Group will be on-site starting in early August, planning to mobilize fully the week of August 17th.

NVTRP is a 40 year-old non-profit organization that helps children and adults with disabilities, youth-at-risk, and recovering military service personnel reach their fullest potential by riding and working with horses. This new space will allow clients to ride year-round, regardless of the weather, and also allow for an expansion of services, hopefully eliminating the typical 1+ year waiting list.
