Historic Clifton

In the summer of 1917, while the Suffragists were silently protesting in front of the White House (Silent Sentinels, as they were called in the media) and being incarcerated up the road at the Occoquan Workhouse, much of the rest of the country was going about their daily lives with a focus on their families and their community. Clifton was no different.

The 24th of June was celebrated as Children's Day! (this year, 2023, it was June 9th!) The town put a lot of energy and intentionality into their celebration of same – clearly making a statement that Children were important and that Families were important! Perhaps we should resurrect such a celebration again!

Note how education and the proud telling of children receiving degrees played a prominent role in the communications family members shared! Marriages happened, people recovered from illnesses (perhaps this was the infamous Spanish Flu – the likes of which were recently referenced during our Covidian era??) and the discussion of "too much drinking in the midst" was certainly a reflection of the nation's Temperance spirit at the time. Finally, the loss of a horse was as devastating as the loss of a car today!

Please travel on this trip back in time to Friday, June 29,1917 as you read "The Clifton" column from the Fairfax Herald.

The Baptist program consisted of songs, drills and recitation of a patriotic nature, and the address was made by Dr. Fristoe, a Baptist evangelist from Maryland. The Presbyterian Sunday School rendered the following program: "Star Spangled Banner", prayer by Rev. Alford Kelley, pastor; song "Holy Twilight Hour" by choir; playlette, "A Tale of Three Boxes" by three young ladies; song, "Marching in His Name" by choir; a missionary exercise consisting of recitations and song, entitled "Flowers" by a number of boys and girls; pastors address by Rev. Alford Kelley; offering for Sunday School missions; song, "America" by congregation; Rev. Alford Kelley then closed with the benediction.

To the Clifton Community:

All are invited to this important event. Please help us spread the word to the greater Clifton community and beyond.

Main Street Enhancement Project Phase 2a in Downtown Historic Clifton Open Forum Public Hearing Thu., Aug. 17, 2023, 7:30–9PM, 12641 Chapel Rd, Clifton, VA 20124 (Wayne H. Nickum Community Meeting Hall)

Find out about proposed street and sidewalk improvements and utility undergrounding on Main St. (Rte. 645) from Ford Ln. to Chapel St. in the Town of Clifton. Proposed project is to improve safety and ADA accessibility for pedestrians and enhance the beautification and function of Main St. as a scenic and historic byway with landscaping and amenities.

Come see the proposed plans and learn about the project timeline and cost estimate. The Hearing will be held in an open format with doors open at 7PM and will begin with a presentation at 7:30PM followed by a question-and-answer session and the opportunity to provide public comments and discuss individually with project team members until 9 PM.

Project information, including the approved National Environmental Policy Act document, is available on the project website at http://cliftonva.gov/committees/specialprojects/. Property impact information and tentative construction schedules are available for review at the above address and will be available at the Public Hearing.

Resource Recovery Tip

You probably know that most big retailers will take back plastic bags. But did you know that they also take dry cleaning bags, bread bags, Ziplock type bags, bubble wrap, ice bags, and more? The recovered plastic film is reprocessed into new bags, pallets, containers, crates, pipe, and composite lumber for making decks, benches, and playground sets.

Some items that are not included are compostable bags, pre-washed salad mix bags, frozen food bags, candy bar wrappers, chip bags, and cut flower sleeves.

Some tips on how to tell if an item is plastic film.

Is there a #2 or #4 in a chasing arrows recycling symbol on the item?

Does the item hold its shape when it is crumpled?

Does it stretch instead of tearing like paper?

If you answer yes to one or more of these questions, then the resource can be recovered.

Resource recovery is more than recycling. It is finding the highest and best use for items including reuse, repurpose, rehome, and recycle.
