# Historic Clifton

So it was the year 1903 – 116 years ago!

Please read the following list of American events in that year (*excerpted from Wikipedia*) – followed on by Clifton events as listed in the June 5, 1903 *Fairfax Herald*. Note the names of people and places in Clifton at that time – many names still carry through our town today! Marriages that came & went, were treated with public notice and the themes of loss and “firsts” in history are as vibrant and unusual as they are today! Finally, issues around the drug of choice at the time, labor/pay disputes, childhood safety along with childhood wholesome entertainment and, finally, food supplements (!), carried a similar fascination by the public, as in 2019!

Lynne Garvey-Hodge, Fairfax County History Commissioner, Springfield, District

In 1903, Teddy Roosevelt was President & on February 15<sup>th</sup> – Morris & Rose Mitchom introduced America’s first teddy bear!

January 19 – The first west-east transatlantic radio broadcast was made from the United States to England.

February 11 – The Oxnard Strike becomes the first time in U.S history that a labor union was formed from members of different races.

February 23 – Cuba leases Guantanamo Bay to the United States into “perpetuity”.

March 2 – In New York City, the Martha Washington Hotel, the first hotel exclusively for women, opens.

May 16 – Luna Park, Coney Island New York, opens.

June 14 – Hapner Flood in the town of Hapner, Oregon is nearly destroyed by a cloudburst that results in a flash flood.

July 23 – Dr. Ernst Pfenning of Chicago becomes the first owner of a Ford Model A.

September 27 – The Wreck of the Old 97 engine at Stillhouse Trestle near Danville, Virginia, kills nine people and inspires a ballad and song.

October 1 – The first modern World Series pits the National League’s Pittsburgh against Boston of the American League.

November 4 – With the encouragement of the United States, Panama proclaims herself independent from Columbia.

November 23 – Colorado Governor James Hamilton Peabody sends the state militia into the town of Cripple Creek to break up a miner’s strike.

December 17 – Orville Wright flies an aircraft with a petrol engine at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, in the first documented, successful, controlled, powered, heavier-than-air flight.

December 30 – A fire in the Iroquois Theatre in Chicago kills 600.

Other events included:

The Lincoln-Lee Legion was established to promote the temperance movement and the signing of alcohol abstinence pledges by children.

The first box of Crayola crayons is made and sold for 5 cents. It contains 8 colors: brown red, orange, yellow, green, blue, violet and black.

Coca-Cola removes cocaine as a key ingredient from their formula; up to this time it has contained approximately nine milligrams of cocaine per glass.

May 3<sup>rd</sup> is the birth of Bing Crosby, early crooner & singer of “White Christmas” .

April 19<sup>th</sup> is the birth of Eliot Ness, American Prohibition Agent.

John Dillinger, depression era American gangster, is born on June 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Clifton (from the *Fairfax Herald*, 6/5/1903)

Mrs. Rena Craig, formerly Mrs. M. Byrne, is back to Virginia from North Carolina, where she went soon after her marriage to Mr. Craig, who lives at Gaston, N.

The family of Mr. W. M. Nash who now owns Woodbury Farm, near here, has moved up for the summer. Mr. Nash is a busy man at No. 500 Centre Market, Washington, where you will find him 313 days in the year.

Mr. Richard Dorsey and family, of Washington were here on Saturday. Mr. Dorsey will move here at once and locate at the Hetzel home for the summer.

Miss Susan R. Hetzel, of Washington, DC, who has large interests in the village, was here on Saturday; she is selling off a good many lots in and around town.

Mr. W. H. Clarke, former agent at Fairfax, has gone to Bealeton, on the Southern, to accept the agency at that place.

Mr. T. A. Ayre is still in charge of the agency at Clifton.

J. L. Fristoe and wife were suddenly called on Friday to Bentonville, Va., their former home, on account of the illness of Mr. Robert Compton, Mr. Fristoe’s brother-in-law. Mrs. Fristoe will remain 10 days or more.

Dr. W. E. Ford is home on a short vacation. Dr. Ford is employed as Intern at the University Hospital, Baltimore, Md. He graduated at Charlottesville University last year and has been at the hospital ever since, rounding up his course by practical experience. We hope the Doctor will hang out his shingle here, as we are sadly in need of a physician.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Otis have returned from Buffalo, N.Y. to their farm near here for the summer months.

The town council will be asked at the next meeting to open five new streets, one of which is an extension or fork of Main street running south, which afford some very nice building lots in that part of town.



### “The Elephant in the Room”

After a disappointing election season, members of the Republican Women of Clifton (RWC), have come through strong with a surge in numbers and motivated volunteers. To quote a member, “We are the elephant in the room.”

Activities since November have included taking to the halls of Congress in support of Justice Brett Kavanaugh, a tour of the “Christmas” White House; and volunteering for Arlington Cemetery’s “Wreaths Across America,” a tradition of placing fresh wreaths on the headstones of our Nation’s fallen heroes during the winter holidays. We celebrated the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. with re-dedication to his cornerstone belief that people not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character.

Two guest speakers addressed the March membership meeting: Del. Bob Marshall emphasized the need to commit to the due process of law and explained the pros and cons of the proposed Equal Rights Amendment. Pat Wirth, Executive Director/CEO of the Turning Point Suffragist Memorial Association, “introduced us” to the brave and determined leaders of the five million suffragists who fought for more than seven decades to win the vote for American Women.

This fall, school board members will be on the ballot. We will be working hard to support candidates who emphasize an education system that creates successful citizens. We want candidates who are committed to fiscal accountability to the Fairfax County taxpayers. We want the school board to listen to parents and constituents and to take their views into consideration.

As a club, we support educating the public about the Constitution, keeping it front and center, and distributing Pocket Constitutions when we volunteer at public events, such as the polls, Clifton day, and farmers’ markets.

Community pickle ball came to Clifton last year when the CBA purchased equipment and began hosting pick-up games two times a week in the town's park. The idea of an outdoor pickle ball competition emerged when the CBA's winter ping pong tournament was put on hold due to renovation work that temporarily closed the Clifton Town Hall.

"We all had fun today," said Stein, the organization's president. "Hopefully the excitement generated by the tournament will lead to more players when we start playing again in the spring."

The free event was open to all CBA members and their guests regardless of playing ability. Experienced players explained the rules for pickle ball and assisted as needed during the tournament. Among the spectators was Fairfax County Supervisor Pat Herrity (R-Springfield), who stopped by to cheer on the players.

## Join the City Nature Challenge!

City Nature Challenge is a friendly, world-wide competition between metropolitan areas to see who can document the most nature observations in a four day period. Anyone can participate on their own by uploading photos of plants and wildlife to the iNaturalist website, either with a camera and home computer, or directly with a smart phone. For those who would like to join other people in this fun project, there will be two events held in Clifton to which all are invited.

1. Saturday, April 27, Chapel Road Park, 10 am to noon. Margaret Fisher will lead a general plant and wildlife survey for an hour or so. Afterwards, anyone who wants to stay can help remove some of the invasive plants (this is totally optional!) No experience is necessary, just a desire to learn about our more-than-human neighbors and the plants that support them. Bring either a camera or a smart phone. If you are planning to use your phone, download the free iNaturalist app ahead of time, create an account, and turn on location services for when the app is in use. If you are using a camera, plan to upload the photos from your computer by April 29.
